The Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence is the nation's signature recognition of high achievement and performance in America's community colleges. West Kentucky Community and Technical College (WKCTC) has been named by The Aspen Institute as one of the ten finalists for the Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence five times since the prize's inception in 2011, twice as a Finalist with Distinction. WKCTC has also been recognized four times as a Bellwether Finalist by the Community College Futures Assembly, and in 2019 was recognized by BestColleges.com as the #1 community college in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. Consistently achieving such high levels of national recognition speaks to the quality education WKCTC provides to all students.

Not only does WKCTC provide a high-quality educational experience, but it also plays a significant role in the local economy and is a sound investment for students and the community. According to a 2019 economic impact study completed by Economic Modeling Specialists, Inc. (EMSI), students receive a return on investment of \$6.40 in increased lifetime earnings for every \$1 invested with the College, while the community receives a return on investment of \$11.30 in added state revenue and societal savings.
